In 2025, we remained firmly committed to helping build a world based on solidarity and sustainability. Founded in July 2023, the Audemars Piguet Foundation for Common Good spent a year structuring its operations and forming a team of dedicated professionals before carrying out its first actions in Switzerland and, from 2024, internationally.

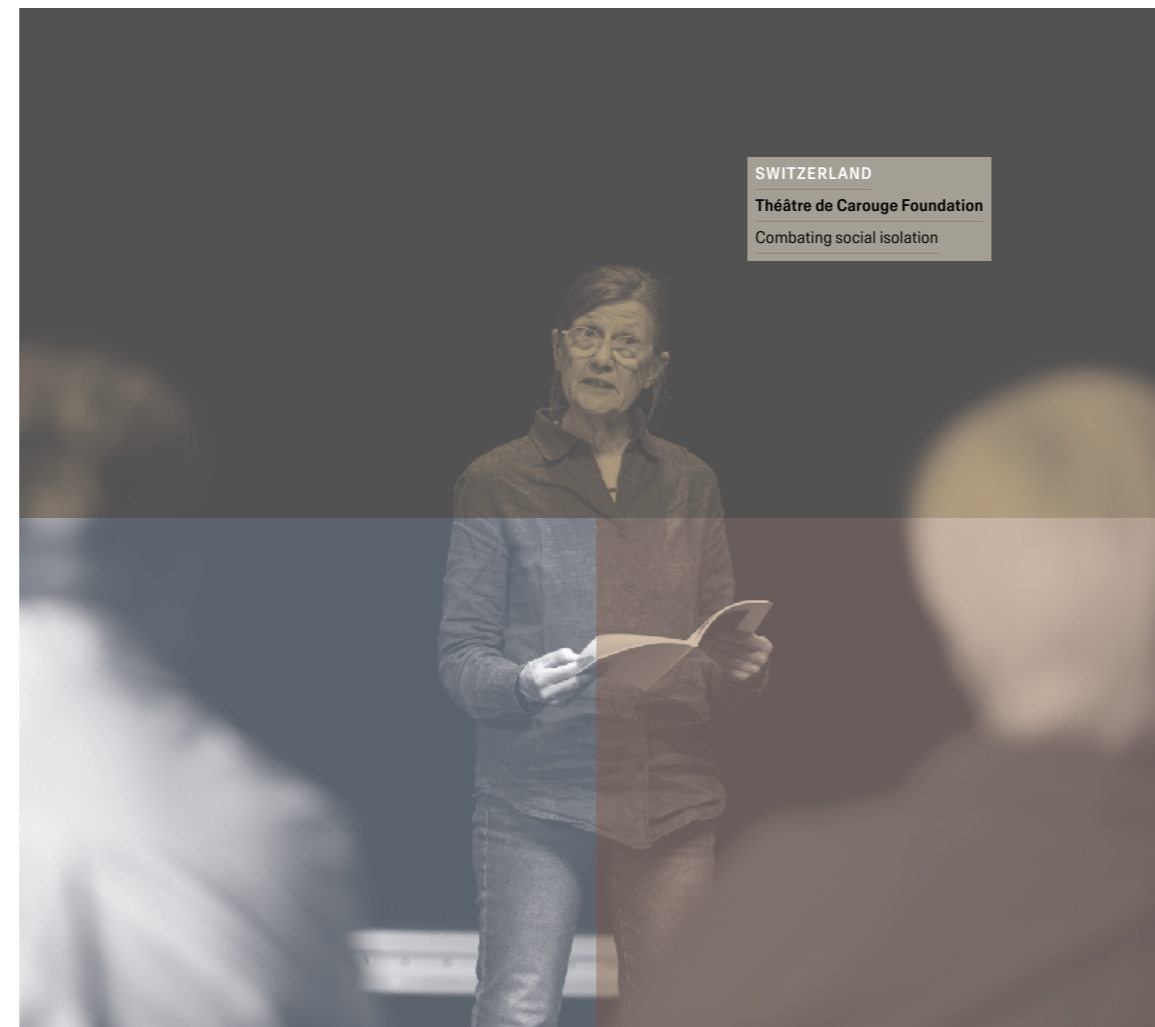
Our mission is clear: to promote social equity and education through action. Since our creation, we have supported 70 projects and organisations, providing total funding of more than 25 million Swiss francs. In 2025, we continued our commitment to combating food insecurity by financially supporting dozens of food banks and food distribution organisations all over the world. These efforts were further strengthened by the first initiatives of our corporate volunteering programme – launched in 2019 – at Audemars Piguet subsidiaries, allowing our partner NGOs to benefit from the lifeblood of the Group’s employees throughout the world.

In order to enhance our systemic impact, we began a collaboration with the European Food Banks Federation (FEBA), seeking to develop a common framework for assessing the social and environmental impact of food banks. In parallel, a pilot programme run in partnership with the Nonprofit Builder network is helping around fifteen organisations in Europe and the United States to develop their expertise.

In a context of reduced public funding and increasingly complex operating frameworks for non-profit organisations, our holistic approach – combining financial support, corporate volunteering and organisational development – is a sustainable driving force for NGO resilience and independence, thereby helping to foster a more robust and enduring solidarity ecosystem.

We extend our warmest thanks to all of our partners for their commitment and the quality of their work, as well as to our board and team members. Finally, we would like to express our deepest gratitude to Audemars Piguet, whose support and trust are the cornerstones of our mission to promote social equity and education.

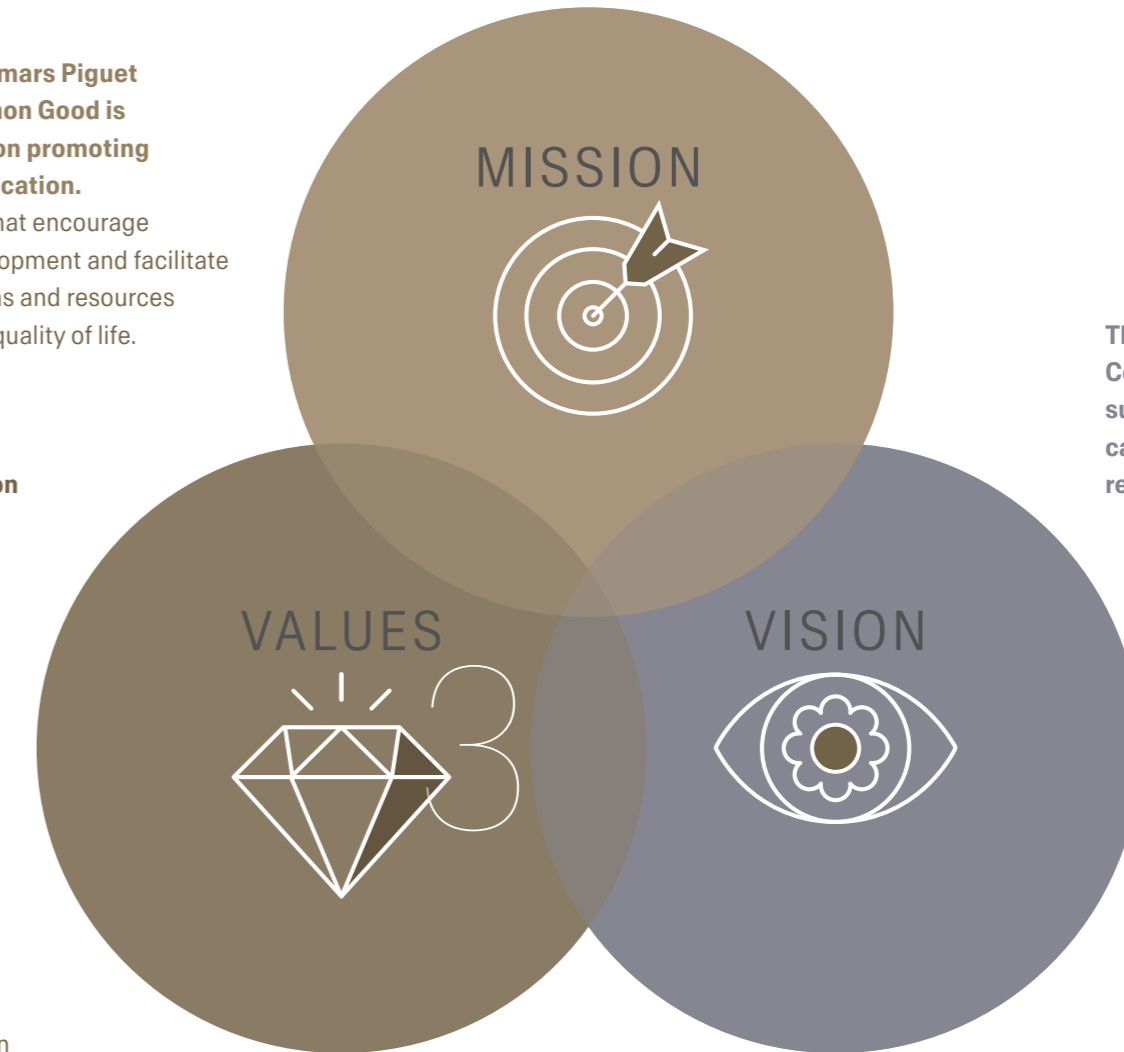
MISSION, VISION AND VALUES

Social equity

Through its Social equity initiatives, the Audemars Piguet Foundation for Common Good strives to improve the quality of life, the prospects and the resilience of vulnerable people.

To this end, it supports local initiatives which fight precariousness, in particular through food aid and emergency shelter, and which combat social isolation through sport and culture.



Fighting precariousness through food aid and emergency shelter

Meeting basic needs such as food and shelter is a prerequisite for dignity.



Combating social isolation through sport and culture

Sport and culture promote dialogue and human relations. They also foster a sense of belonging and help to prevent isolation.



Training educators and trainers

Educators and trainers shape the futures of young people. Providing them with comprehensive training helps them to deliver high-quality education.



Promoting vocational training and craftsmanship

Developing technical skills and soft skills creates new opportunities and improves job prospects. In parallel, promoting manual trades ensures that skills are passed on.

Education

Through its Education initiatives, the Audemars Piguet Foundation for Common Good aims to help young people gain access to high-quality education and training, to prepare them for today's world and the future, and improve their job prospects.

To achieve this, we focus on training educators and trainers while promoting vocational training and craftsmanship.

OUR CROSS-DISCIPLINARY PRIORITIES

Organisational development (OD)

In order to complement the funding provided to NGOs, the Audemars Piguet Foundation for Common Good has an organisational development (OD) department.



Enhancing the abilities, effectiveness and resilience of NGOs

OD helps organisations to acquire the tools and resources they need to adapt and make progress in an environment that is constantly evolving.

Emergency aid

Through its emergency aid programme, the Audemars Piguet Foundation for Common Good provides essential resources and immediate support to help communities build resilience in the face of adversity.

In addition to its main activities, the Foundation supports populations affected by natural disasters in the areas where Audemars Piguet operates.

Corporate volunteering

The Audemars Piguet Foundation for Common Good is present in the countries where Audemars Piguet operates, enabling employees around the world to play an active role in the organisations it supports. This initiative reflects our desire to do more than offer financial support, by also providing valuable human resources and expertise.

In 2025, building on five successful years in Switzerland and marking Audemars Piguet's 150th anniversary, the Foundation rolled out the corporate volunteering programme internationally. AN ASSESSMENT OF SOCIAL EQUITY AND EDUCATION

Social equity

Social inequality constitutes a major global challenge with disparities related to people's origins, their economic situation, where they live and their access to education. In 2025, 808 million people in the world were living in extreme poverty (on less than \$3 per day), which is 9.9% of the world's population (World Bank, 2025).

In Asia in 2025, around 135 million people were living in extreme poverty (3.2% of the population), with high concentrations in India, China and South-East Asia (World Bank, 2025). Social isolation is increasing, particularly in Japan where 1.5 million elderly people live alone, and in China where ageing and urbanisation are exacerbating the solitude of elderly people and internal migrants.

In Europe, around 93.3 million people, or 21% of the population, were exposed to poverty or social exclusion in 2024 (Eurostat, 2024). Social isolation is particularly prevalent among the elderly, affecting 30% to 40% of people aged over 65. In Switzerland, the first report on the national monitoring of poverty (2025) cited a poverty rate of around 8% (almost 700,000 people), particularly affecting the unemployed, single-parent families, households with children, people with few qualifications, foreigners and the elderly.

In the United States, in 2024, almost 35.9 million people were living below the poverty line, including 10 million children (US Census Bureau, 2024). Social isolation

affects 28% of adults, with a substantial impact on the elderly and minorities.

This overview illustrates the extent of poverty and social isolation, despite some progress being made. It highlights the urgency of targeted initiatives to guarantee fair access to essential resources and support vulnerable individuals.

Education

In 2025, access to high-quality education remained a key challenge. Despite progress, 272 million children and young people aged 6-17, or around 11% of school-age children, were still outside the school system (UNESCO). Poverty constitutes a decisive obstacle. In many regions, families do not have the means to pay for education, and millions of children work to support their family. These constraints result in early school dropouts and limit access to higher education and vocational training.

Discrimination related to gender, origin or place of residence accentuate inequalities in education. Regional differences remain stark: in 2024, 33% of school-age children and young people in low-income countries were unschooled, compared to just 3% in high-income countries (UNESCO). More than half of the world's unschooled children live in Sub-Saharan Africa.

Data from the Education at a Glance 2024 report (OECD) and international assessments (PIRLS, PISA) show that these inequalities are evident from a very young age. In primary school, pupils from low-income families generally have a lower level of attainment than their peers from more privileged backgrounds.

In addition to these inequalities, there is the issue of teaching quality. In many countries, infrastructure is insufficient and the lack of qualified teachers compromises learning. Worldwide, an additional 44 million teachers are required by 2030 in order to meet educational need, including almost 15 million in Sub-Saharan Africa. These difficulties have a direct impact on the social integration of young people. In OECD countries, 14% of young people aged 18 to 24 were not in education, employment or training (NEET) in 2023. This figure was largely made up of the most vulnerable young people.

These observations are a reminder that education is much more than just a right. It is a key means of breaking the poverty cycle and strengthening social cohesion. Investing in inclusive measures, improving infrastructure and training teachers are the clear priorities for ensuring that each young person can access fair, high-quality education.

CHINA
 Organisation: Green Food Bank
 Project: **Distribution of food parcels**
 Duration: 2024 → 2028

This project seeks to support urban families living in poverty – often due to unemployment, illness or other difficulties – by providing them with food parcels. The initiative also encourages companies and individuals to donate any surplus food in order to reduce food waste and redistribute these resources to those who need them most.

"The food parcels delivered each month are much more than just food. They have helped me in my most difficult moments. I'm 71, I'm a widow, I have a severe disability that significantly restricts my movement, and I look after my elderly mother who has cognitive difficulties. Life isn't easy, but I try to find joy in studying traditional Chinese medicine, painting and learning computer skills. The Green Food Bank and its volunteers remind me that I'm not alone. Their support fills my tummy, but most importantly my heart."

CZECH REPUBLIC
 Organisation: Czech Federation of Food Banks
 Project: **Ensuring distribution of food aid and enhancement of food bank**
 Duration: 2025 → 2027

The Czech Federation of Food Banks combats hunger and food waste by coordinating the activities of the region's 15 food banks. Faced with increasing costs and higher demand, the project is striving to strengthen the Federation's logistical capacities by improving the storage and distribution of food through its centre in Prague and its network of distribution points.

2025 Overview – Highlights and impact

In 2025, volunteers in several Chinese cities helped form community bonds through initiatives in the field and direct engagement with beneficiaries. These efforts helped improve the effectiveness of food distribution while fostering a sense of community, in particular through cookery workshops bringing together volunteers and beneficiaries.

Results

- 10 events organised in Shanghai, Beijing, Chengdu, Shenzhen and Hangzhou
- 73 volunteers providing a total of 166 hours of service (sorting, packing and distributing food parcels)
- Increased mobilisation of urban volunteers supporting key food aid operations and promoting solidarity between communities

Organisation: Art Explora

Project: Les apARTés

Duration: 2025 → 2028

The Art Explora Foundation strives to make art accessible to all, particularly people with limited access to cultural activities. The project supports the 'Les apARTés' programme which organises art events hosted by trained volunteers in an effort to combat loneliness among the elderly and rebuild social connections. This support is helping to extend the scheme to an additional 10 cities each year and to improve volunteer training, fostering inclusion and well-being through culture.

Organisation: Fondation pour le Logement des Défavorisés

Project: The "Espace Clovis" respite centre in Metz

Duration: 2024 → 2026

The "Espace Clovis" Boutique Solidarité was opened in Metz in 2006 in response to the lack of daytime facilities for people in need in the area. The centre welcomes anyone suffering from social exclusion. Between 50 and 130 visitors come every morning. Espace Clovis proposes essential services: breakfast, showers, laundry facilities, secure storage for belongings and a postal address for beneficiaries to receive post. It also helps to rebuild social connections and offers the support of a social worker to facilitate administrative procedures and encourage independence. A community kitchen completes the service, providing hot meals in a warm, welcoming setting.

Rebuilding connection, independence and hope for those facing exclusion.

2025 Overview – Highlights and impact

In 2024-25, the Boutique Solidarité pursued its work, receiving people living in poverty in a warm, welcoming and reassuring environment.

Results

- 18,503 visits, including 1,407 new people
- 7,451 breakfasts served
- 2,488 showers
- 211 loads of laundry
- 53 users of the secure storage facility
- 286 people used the address to receive post
- 505 people provided with social support
- 11,898 hot meals served
- 600 free transport tickets provided to facilitate administrative procedures and healthcare

Organisation: Le Refettorio

Project: Le Refettorio Paris: charitable & anti-waste gastronomy

Duration: 2025 → 2027

Opened in 2018 by the Food for Soul association, the Refettorio Paris is a 100% anti-waste community kitchen. Located in the crypt of La Madeleine church, it proposes gastronomic meals prepared using unsold food and is intended exclusively for people living in poverty. The project aims to develop the Refettorio's provision for women and children, improve the quality of services and allow it to pursue its cultural initiatives, thereby helping to combat food insecurity and social exclusion.

Organisation: Les Restos du Cœur – Les Relais du Cœur

Project: A 10% increase in the distribution of hot meals to the most disadvantaged people in Paris

Duration: 2024 → 2026

Founded in 1985 by Coluche, the Restos du Cœur's original mission was to distribute meals to the most disadvantaged throughout winter. Since then, the charity has broadened its scope and now runs many schemes for combating exclusion and improving the lives of people living in poverty. In Paris, where poverty is particularly acute, the Restos du Cœur play a key role through a number of distribution centres and targeted support programmes. This project strives to increase the number of hot meals served annually to Parisians suffering hardship by 10%, which represents an additional 69,000 meals.

Gourmet meals prepared using unsold food to combat food insecurity and social exclusion.

2025 Overview – Highlights and impact

In 2024-25, the Restos du Cœur ran two main initiatives: the distribution of food parcels for beneficiaries able to cook meals themselves, and the distribution of hot meals to homeless people. These meals are prepared and reheated in the Atelier Chantier d'Insertion (ACI – work integration workshop), then dispatched to four indoor centres and nine street distribution points, as well as to street outreach initiatives.

However, the aim of the project – increasing the number of hot meals distributed by 10% – has not yet been achieved. Several factors have played a role in this: a 7% increase in the unit cost of the hot meals purchased, the bankruptcy of one of the key suppliers, and a decrease in public subsidies from the Paris local authorities.

Project: Korbinian-Küche
 Duration: 2025 → 2027

Faced with the increasing demand for food aid after the Covid-19 pandemic, in 2020 Caritas launched the Korbinian-Küche mobile kitchen, which has become an inclusive distribution centre for people living in poverty. Every day, it serves up to 600 meals and hot drinks, as well as offering support and a listening ear.

Project: Food Angel programme: supporting the production of hot meals
 Duration: 2025 → 2029

The Food Angel programme combats food waste and food insecurity in Hong Kong by collecting still-edible foods and turning them into nutritious meals. The project helps provide hot meals, particularly to the elderly, in order to further develop this key pillar of the programme. This contribution will allow more than 380,000 meals to be distributed over three years, consolidating Food Angel's work and its commitment to long-term dignified food aid.

Project: Food Wanted, Not Wasted
 Duration: 2025 → 2027

Feeding Hong Kong combats food waste and food insecurity by collecting and redistributing surplus food. In 2024, the organisation saved 1,320 tonnes of food, providing more than 150 support organisations with 3.6 million meals. The Food Wanted, Not Wasted programme is striving to increase its capacity by improving its infrastructure, building a skilled team, acquiring additional lorries, and investing in storage facilities.

HONG KONG

Organisation: ImpactHK

Project: Emergency shelter and accommodation programme

Duration: 2024 → 2027



This programme offers homeless people comprehensive support by meeting both their immediate and long-term needs. Beneficiaries have access to safe, comfortable accommodation, and essential services such as nutritious meals, sanitary facilities and healthcare.

2025 Overview – Highlights and impact

In 2025, the programme evolved significantly. The living conditions of beneficiaries were greatly improved through better hygiene, renovated facilities and reliable access to air-conditioning in summer and hot water in winter. The social and professional integration of the residents was improved, specifically through vocational training provision.

Results

- Relocation to a new site offering 58 accommodation spaces
- 100 new homeless people welcomed
- Average occupation rate of 76.8%
- 119 residents (85%) completed their support plan
- 30 community activities organised (meetings, cleaning days, outings, social events, medical check-ups etc.)



ITALY

Organisation: Opera San Francesco per i Poveri (OSF)

Project: One meal a day

Duration: 2024 → 2027

This project aims to provide more than 2,100 people with hot meals every Monday to Saturday. These meals are served by volunteers at lunch and dinner in the Opera San Francesco per i Poveri (OSF) canteen situated in Corso Concordia, in the heart of Milan.

2025 Overview – Highlights and impact

In 2025, the Corso Concordia canteen distributed slightly more meals than in 2024. This increase was notably due to access restrictions to the second OSF canteen (Piazzale Velasquez), which has been dedicated solely to physically vulnerable people since June 2025. It also reflects a general increase in the number of people living in poverty in Milan.

Results

- 758,360 meals distributed in the Concordia canteen
- 22,617 people received
- +1.1% meals served compared to 2024

ITALY

Organisation: Pane Quotidiano

Project: Home food distribution to elderly and disabled people

Duration: 2024 → 2026

Since 2021, this project has been working to provide food parcels to people with severe disabilities and living in food insecurity. The initiative is based on sustained investment in human resources and logistical equipment, in an effort to support 400 people.

2025 Overview – Highlights and impact

In 2025, the project underwent significant growth with a 30% increase in the number of beneficiaries. Pane Quotidiano increased its operational capacity by purchasing two new electric vans, allowing it to expand the area covered by the delivery service while reducing its carbon footprint.

Results

- 12,098 food parcels delivered to homes
- 70,437 kg of foodstuffs delivered
- 16 distribution rounds per week
- 42 volunteers involved each week

JAPAN

Organisation: Moyai Support Centre for Independent Living

Project: "Moyai Café" community project

Duration: 2025 → 2029

The Moyai Support Centre for Independent Living supports homeless and disadvantaged people in Japan by providing easier access to housing and by combating social isolation. Faced with the increase in loneliness and the constraints imposed by the organisation's premises, the project is supporting the creation of the Moyai Café, a permanent, inclusive space offering advice, support and community life. The café will help consolidate existing support programmes and provide isolated people with an environment where they can reconnect with others.



JAPAN

Organisation: Second Harvest Japan

Project: Enhancing food and rice distribution

Duration: 2025 → 2028

Second Harvest Japan, the country's leading food bank, is working to establish a national food security network. In collaboration with other organisations, it provides food aid to the most disadvantaged people while combating social isolation. The project aims to increase the distribution of rice, a staple food that is often in short supply. It includes the preparation of bento boxes, the creation of a distribution space for vulnerable households and the purchase of nutritious foods to compensate for the lack of food donations.



JORDAN

Organisation: Tkiyet Um Ali

Project: Wayfarer programme: daily hot meals

Duration: 2025 → 2029

Tkiyet Um Ali, a member of the Global FoodBanking Network (GFN), works to combat hunger and malnutrition in Jordan by offering long-term food aid to vulnerable people. The project supports the Wayfarer programme which, each month, provides hot, nutritious meals to around 5,000 people living in extreme poverty.

KOREA

Organisation: Korea Foodbank

Project: Improving nutrition among vulnerable populations

Duration: 2025 → 2027

Founded in 1998, the Korean Food Bank supports vulnerable low-income groups, in particular elderly and disabled people facing nutritional deficiencies. The aim of the project is to distribute food that is nearing its use-by date as well as personalised parcels enriched with essential nutrients adapted to the specific needs of beneficiaries.

MALAYSIA

Organisation: Kechara Soup Kitchen Society

Project: Food pack distribution for the "Soup Kitchen" programme

Duration: 2025 → 2027

The Kechara Soup Kitchen Society is working to improve the living conditions of homeless people in Malaysia. Through its "Soup Kitchen" programme, it provides essential services, including food aid, medical care, accommodation and employability support. The project complements these efforts with the distribution of meals to around 720 beneficiaries in Kuala Lumpur.



MEXICO

Organisation: Alimento Para Todos

Project: Optimisation of food distribution and nutritional improvement for vulnerable populations

Duration: 2025 → 2027

The goal of the project is to improve the food security of vulnerable communities in Mexico City and the metropolitan area. It involves buying and distributing essential products to add to the food parcels prepared from donations to ensure the contents allow for a balanced diet. The initiative will be able to cater for 320,000 beneficiaries, helping to reduce malnutrition and increase the resilience of disadvantaged families.

NETHERLANDS

Organisation: Voedselbank Amsterdam

Project: Upgrade of foodbank location in Amsterdam South

Duration: 2024 → 2025

The Amsterdam food bank supports residents whose income means they are temporarily unable to buy enough food to meet their own needs. The majority of beneficiaries receive parcels composed mainly of prepared food. Two distribution points – in Amsterdam North and Amsterdam South – also work like shops, allowing those supported by the programme to choose for themselves from the available products. The Amsterdam South space required renovation work in order to increase its capacity, specifically replacing existing storage spaces and purchasing new furniture.

Modernising the Amsterdam South site so it can cater for more families suffering hardship.

2025 Overview – Highlights and impact

The renovations scheduled for 2025 were completed as planned, despite a slight delay of a few months. Voedselbank Amsterdam also started to roll out its strategy designed to allow more beneficiaries to use the store concept. Currently, around 272 people come each week and the organisation plans to cater for 350 to 380 beneficiaries in 2026. In order to increase its capacity, more volunteers were recruited for this site in 2025.

Results

- Renovation of the storage building
- Renovation of the store, including the replacement and modernisation of refrigerators and freezers
- Installation of a new air-conditioning and sun protection system
- Complete refurbishment of the outside paving for better accessibility and safety
- Replacement of an old van with an electric vehicle to collect foodstuffs and other donations in the neighbourhood

SPAIN

Organisation: Fundación Banco de Alimentos de Madrid

Project: Covering a part of the basic nutritional needs, specifically milk for those most in need in Madrid

Duration: 2024 → 2025

This programme strives to ensure that 5,000 vulnerable children and 1,700 over-75s living in Madrid are provided with a glass of milk every day. The initiative relies on a network of committed partners for its logistics, distribution and the monitoring of beneficiaries.

2025 Overview – Highlights and impact

In 2025, the project fulfilled all of its quantitative objectives, ensuring daily distributions to all of the planned beneficiaries. By optimising its purchases, the programme exceeded initial expectations.

Results

- 6,700 beneficiaries
- More than 300,000 litres of milk distributed
- 100% of quantitative objectives reached
- A reinforced network of partners, more involved in logistics and monitoring

The aim of the Community Food Pack programme is to provide regular monthly food support to low-income households in order to help them face the increase in the cost of living and maintain stable access to high-quality food.

The Food Bank Singapore combats food insecurity by redistributing surplus food nationwide. Since 2012, the organisation – which supports more than 300,000 people – has distributed more than 22 million meals. The goal of the project is to provide food parcels suited to the needs and cultural preferences of the beneficiaries, to ensure they have a balanced, nutritious diet. It will allow more than 7,400 parcels to be distributed each year, which is the equivalent of 373,000 meals.

Caritas Vaud fights poverty and social exclusion through a variety of services, including food aid. In response to the increase in food insecurity, the project is working to ensure vulnerable people can have regular access to food providing a balanced diet. It involves developing the Lausanne region food bank which redistributes food to around 12,000 beneficiaries each week, provides hot meals in emergency accommodation to more than 1,000 homeless people each year, and supports low-income households through Caritas grocery stores.

The Cartons du Cœur association supports people living in poverty in the Neuchâtel canton by offering short-term, free and anonymous food aid. Driven by the increase in demand and the stagnation of donations, the project aims to fund the purchase of more foods and the distribution of vouchers, guaranteeing continuity and the nutritional value of the assistance it provides.

The Centrale Alimentaire du Nord vaudois (CA-NOV) collects and redistributes basic necessities to social welfare organisations in the region. Responding to the increase in needs and shortage of certain essential foods, the project assists with the purchase of additional foodstuffs and the logistical development of the association. This support will guarantee the continuity of food aid and diversify supply, helping to improve the quality of life of people living in poverty.

The Colis du Cœur Foundation distributes food and hygiene products every week to almost 8,500 people in need in the canton of Geneva. Following the significant increase in demand and the loss of a major source of funding, the project supports the ColiShops scheme, free digital grocery stores designed to offer dignity and nutritional quality. This support will help maintain and strengthen capacity, logistics and volunteer training, ensuring the ongoing provision of fair, sustainable food aid.

2025 Overview – Highlights and impact

In 2025, the Community Food Pack programme continued to play an essential role in improving the food security of low-income individuals and families living in Singapore. In addition to the non-perishable foodstuffs usually distributed, the programme increased its provision of fresh produce such as eggs, fruit and vegetables, involving a large number of volunteers.

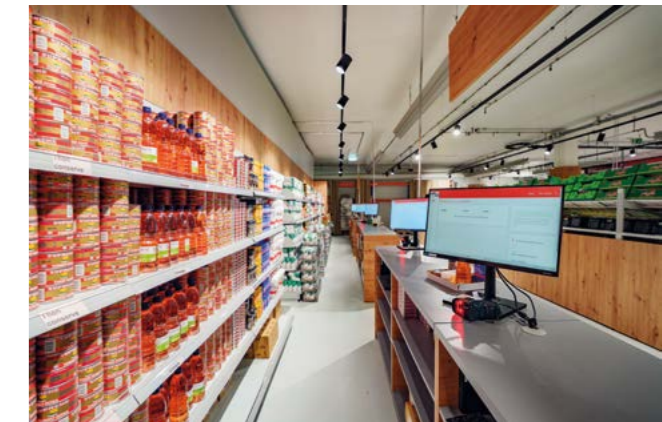

Project: Social support drop-in centre

Duration: 2024 → 2028

Founded in 2008, the Red Cross social support drop-in centre in Geneva works to promote social cohesion in the canton of Geneva. It supports anyone experiencing vulnerability, and offers a listening ear, personalised guidance and basic necessities (food, hygiene, survival equipment etc.). Its goal is to help bring stability to situations of extreme distress and promote independence and access to sustainable solutions.

"A lot of the people that come to us are extremely vulnerable, sometimes psychologically exhausted, experiencing times of great distress or mental health issues. For many of them, the social support drop-in centre is the only place where they can still find a listening ear before they detach completely from the system. Since 2025, we have been working to ensure a more human and fairer response to these situations, while protecting all those working in the centre. This work is continuing in 2026. Developing skills, establishing clear frameworks and protecting mental health on both sides of the desk is key."

2025 Overview – Highlights and impact

In 2025, the drop-in centre consolidated its structural reorganisation in order to meet constantly growing demand while guaranteeing a high-quality service. The team improved the quality of its appointments through an overall systematic analysis of experience. This expertise improved individual independence and links with partner services.

Results

- 4,838 support meetings conducted (2,424 as emergencies, 2,414 pre-arranged)
- 3,433 beneficiaries from 2,776 households supported
- 52% new beneficiaries and 1,646 children directly or indirectly concerned
- 1,397 food certifications for the Colis du Cœur
- 610 supermarket vouchers and 652 cards for the Caritas grocery store distributed
- 962 sleeping bags handed out to homeless people
- 2,366 clothing vouchers and 578 hygiene kits distributed
- 342 leisure grants given to 292 children, facilitating access to recreational, artistic or sporting activities

Duration: 2025 → 2027

La Halte is a food distribution organisation based in the Morges district (canton of Vaud). Every week, it provides people living in poverty in the Morges region with fresh, unsold food donated by local businesses. Beneficiaries are identified notably by Caritas Vaud and the Salvation Army. La Halte supports more than 40 families, to whom it distributes more than 1,000 food parcels each year with the help of 40 volunteers.

Project: Combating vulnerability in senior citizens through social participation, culture and sport

Duration: 2025 → 2028

Pro Senectute Vaud works to ensure the well-being of elderly people by offering affordable cultural and sporting activities in order to prevent vulnerability and isolation. The project supports five key initiatives: guided excursions, cinema sessions, home exercise classes, balance workshops and outdoor training sessions. This support helps elderly people to remain independent, increase their physical abilities and promote the social connections that are key to their quality of life.

Project: For sustainable and inclusive food preservation

Duration: 2025 → 2026

Sierre Partage provides essential food aid to people living in poverty in the city of Sierre and surrounding area in the Valais canton. Faced with the increase in poverty and ageing facilities, the project aims to modernise refrigeration equipment in order to ensure the quality of foodstuffs and respect food hygiene standards. This support will improve the environment in which the beneficiaries are received and volunteers work, enhancing the services offered.

Project: Le Printemps Mirandolina – Seniors on stage
 Duration: 2024 → 2025

Printemps Mirandolina is a drama-based pilot project intended to prioritise expression, self-confidence and social connection. For nine weeks, in March and April 2025, one-week drama workshops (half-days) were proposed to organisations working with either elderly people or young people experiencing difficulties. The groups of seniors worked on scenes from *Romeo and Juliet* by William Shakespeare, in a welcoming environment, led by professional actors, including warm-ups, improvisation, diction and acting.

"It took me a few days to digest and finish savouring the delightful week of drama you gave me. At 78, I still can't believe it. I moved, I was shaken, grabbed, hugged; people looked at me, I concentrated, I acted with others, I was young and in love as I spoke my lines. It was as though I was starting to exist again, rather than letting myself go and using age as an excuse! And all of this under the guidance of two very kind, very real, very demanding people(!). 2025 Overview – Highlights and impact
 In 2025, Printemps Mirandolina was the opportunity to test the potential of drama-based mediation with a variety of participants. The workshops offered a secure, fun and stimulating space that encouraged intergenerational interactions and personal expression. The older participants were particularly engaged, their high motivation reflected in an exceptionally low absence rate. Evaluation of the event showed notable benefits, confirming that the scheme effectively combats social isolation.

- Results**
- 15 participating organisations
 - 195 beneficiaries, including 114 seniors and 81 young people
 - Absenteeism among senior participants: 5%
 - Benefits observed: stronger social connections (80.8%), greater self-awareness (79.5%), improved communication skills (61.6%)

 Duration: 2025 → 2028

In response to the rapid ageing of Taiwan's population, the Mennonite Social Welfare Foundation is working to improve the quality of life of elderly, vulnerable and disabled people in Hualien and Taitung counties. The project offers comprehensive support, including home delivery of meals, a 24-hour emergency phone line and everyday living assistance. Every year, around 600 beneficiaries receive support that protects their independence and well-being.

Organisation: Taiwan People's Food Bank Association

Project: Food aid for disadvantaged families

Duration: 2024 → 2027

The Taiwan People's Food Bank Association, the only certified member of the Global FoodBanking Network (GFN) in Taiwan, combats hunger and food waste. Every year, it redistributes more than 320 tonnes of food using a network of 220 partner organisations to reach a large proportion of the population living in poverty. It also distributes around 1,500 food parcels of purchased foods annually to financially vulnerable families, particularly isolated elderly people.



2025 Overview – Highlights and impact

In 2025, the Taiwan People's Food Bank Association organised a major food distribution event in collaboration with volunteers from Audemars Piguet. Around 50 people came together for two days to prepare food parcels.

Results

- 1,500 parcels prepared and distributed to disadvantaged families through 22 nearby organisations
- 12,605 kg of food provided (rice, pasta, powdered milk, tinned food etc.)
- 100% of parcels met the standards of the Taiwan Nutrition Foundation



THAILAND

Organisation: Scholars of Sustenance (SOS)

Project: "Food Rescue" and "Rescue Kitchen" programmes

Duration: 2025 → 2027

Through its Food Rescue and Rescue Kitchen programmes, Scholars of Sustenance (SOS) combats food waste and hunger in Thailand. These initiatives respectively collect surplus food that is still fit for consumption and redistribute it to vulnerable communities, and turn these ingredients into nutritious, ready-to-eat meals. Volunteers help prepare and distribute the food, promoting community collaboration.

Duration: 2025 → 2028

Founded in 1994, FareShare tackles hunger and food waste by redistributing surplus food through a network of 34 regional centres and 8,000 charities and groups. Responding to the cost of living crisis, the "Surplus with Purpose" programme provides fruit and vegetables to people who have no access to healthy food. The project will allow FareShare to redistribute the equivalent of 793,000 meals each year to more than 5,800 people.



UNITED KINGDOM

Organisation: The Felix Project

Project: The Felix Project Kitchen Meals

Duration: 2024 → 2027

Healthy food for more than 5,800 people.

This project collects surplus food and redistributes it to more than 1,200 community organisations in London. Felix's Kitchen prepares around 5,000 healthy meals a day, six days a week. Every day, it benefits thousands of people living in poverty, in particular those who are unable to cook for themselves. The project also ensures foods with a very short shelf life are put to good use.



2025 Overview – Highlights and impact

In 2025, Felix's Kitchen made significant progress, with an increase in its production capacity and greater social impact. The kitchen prepared more than 1.26 million balanced meals that met national nutritional guidelines (Eatwell Guidelines). During the year, the team also welcomed and trained young people not in employment, education or training (NEETs), strengthening the dimension of the project which seeks to improve job prospects.

Results

- 1,266,000 meals prepared and distributed to community organisations throughout London
- More than £5.2 million of community value generated
- 4 apprentice commis chefs, formerly NEETs, received a qualification following a 10-month training programme

Duration: 2025 → 2028



City Harvest, the largest food redistribution organisation in New York, combats food insecurity, which affects 3 million New Yorkers. Faced with the increase in needs and decreased federal aid, the project supports the Mobile Markets programme, which organises free markets in the city's five boroughs in order to provide disadvantaged communities with fresh produce.



UNITED STATES

Organisation: Citymeals on Wheels

Project: Funding weekend meals in November 2024 and 2025

Duration: 2024 → 2026

The project aims to provide elderly, housebound New Yorkers with nutritious meals. Citymeals on Wheels is the city's only non-profit organisation that is entirely focused on providing for these individuals. It ensures that no elderly people in need remain unfed, by tackling the main obstacles hindering their access to regular, well-balanced meals. To date, the organisation has delivered more than 72 million meals, and supports more than 22,000 elderly people in the city's five boroughs.

2025 Overview – Highlights and impact

In 2025, Citymeals was working in a particularly difficult context. Cuts to SNAP allowances (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program) affected many elderly New Yorkers and increased the demand for reliable food aid.

Results

- 32,000 weekend meals delivered to 3,200 beneficiaries in Manhattan, in addition to distributions made by Citymeals throughout the week
- 6,598 additional meals delivered in response to the food emergency caused by SNAP benefit cuts

MANNA FoodBank works with a network of local partners to combat food insecurity in the west of North Carolina. Through its mobile community markets, the organisation distributes nutritious food to people living in rural or underserved areas, while also supporting regional agriculture. The project supports four new markets established in McDowell, Buncombe, Jackson and Yancey counties. Every year, these markets will provide healthy food to around 8,000 people and help make communities more resilient.

Organisation: Rethink Food

Project: Sustaining communities, nourishing lives

Duration: 2025 → 2027



The NGO Rethink Food based in New York is working to create a fair and sustainable food system. Since 2017, it has distributed more than 30 million meals and rescued almost 1,200 tonnes of surplus food. The aim of the project is to improve the infrastructure of its sustainable community kitchen, notably by upgrading equipment, optimising transport and preparing hot meals for vulnerable communities. This will allow for around 36,000 additional meals to be distributed over two years, helping to fulfil some of the 200,000 requests made in New York.

Organisation: Acta Vista

Project: Trans'Faire: tomorrow, a job for everyone

Duration: 2024 → 2027

Acta Vista works with people who are disengaged from employment – 30% of whom are under the age of 30 – training them in trades relating to the restoration of old buildings. On the Fort Saint-Nicolas site in Marseille, France's primary heritage employment integration project, apprenticeships are carried out in real-life situations, turning the site into an open-air training school. Each beneficiary is provided with personalised social and professional support to help secure their career path and build a robust plan for the future. Furthermore, future generations are introduced to traditional skills (building, metalwork, carpentry) through activities designed for young people.

2025 Overview – Highlights and impact

In 2025, Acta Vista supported and trained around one hundred young people, while developing digital workshops to facilitate their everyday administrative tasks. Beneficiaries that were part of an employment integration programme and had poor language skills were also offered French lessons. The association also diversified its activities by conducting a feasibility study on building sites dedicated to reusing materials and launching a programme to accelerate ecological transition on building sites in Marseilles. In parallel, it developed the expertise of its teams through site safety and logistics training courses.

Results

- Around one hundred under-30s recruited, supported and trained
- More than 90% of employees who sat the exam qualified as "mason specialising in historic buildings"
- 2 out of 3 entered employment or further training
- 2 exchange trips within Europe for the employment integration programme teams
- 2 new employment integration projects started in the south
- 200,000 people visited Fort Saint-Nicolas in Marseille following the restoration work

Organisation: De l'or dans les mains

Project: Introducing 5,200 secondary school pupils to manual trades

Duration: 2023 → 2026

Founded in 2021, De l'or dans les mains is working to incorporate manual trades into the education system. The organisation develops educational programmes allowing secondary school pupils to make an object or try out an artisanal technique with a professional, directly linked to the school curriculum. This 10-hour programme, incorporated into the school day, combines practical workshops led by artisans with classroom sessions, where teachers use the organisation's tools to make the link between academic knowledge and craftsmanship. In parallel, the association carries out important awareness-raising work with the authorities and public opinion.

Reincorporating manual trades into the education system.

2025 Overview – Highlights and impact

In 2025, De l'or dans les mains continued to develop its manual trades discovery programme, consolidating its presence in partner secondary schools and strengthening its network of engaged artisans. 2025 also saw an extension of its national efforts to raise awareness, positioning the association as a key player in promoting manual skills in education.

Results

- 3,654 young people benefited from the programme
- 32 secondary schools involved
- 1,027 manual workshops held
- 74% of young people had never met an artisan before the programme
- 22% now want to work in a manual trade

Project: Transforming schools to promote success for all

Duration: 2025 → 2028



Ecolhuma is working to build the expertise of teachers around France in order to improve the quality of education and reduce learning inequalities. The education system is in crisis, marked by worrying academic outcomes and a lack of in-service training. In response, this programme aims to train 250,000 teachers, support 150 schools and improve the learning of 4.5 million pupils over three years.

Project: Support the scale-up of Teach For Italy to tackle education inequalities in Italy

Duration: 2024 → 2027

This initiative focuses on the upscaling of Teach For Italy, which is working to prevent inequalities in education and reduce school drop-outs by placing highly-trained, motivated teachers, known as "fellows", in disadvantaged schools. By developing its fellowship programme nationally and testing an innovative combined teaching model in the southern regions – where school drop-out rates are highest – the project strives to increase pupil engagement, improve their results and broaden their long-term prospects.

2025 Overview – Highlights and impact

In 2025, Teach For Italy launched a pilot programme in the south of Italy and its islands, working directly in schools whose drop-out rates are among the highest. In each of these communities, Teach For Italy has sought to improve the education system as a whole.

Results

- Reach extended from 8 regions in 2024 to 17 for the 2025-26 academic year
- Coverage increased from 19 to 43 provinces
- Network of schools extended from 37 to 80 schools
- 145 fellows supported for the 2024-25 and 2025-26 academic years
- Impact on 13,000 pupils over the same period
- Alumni community extended to 100 former fellows
- Launch of the 2025-2027 fellowship with 61 new fellows selected
- Organisation of 3 summer camps, 2 retreats, an alumni summit and end-of-programme celebrations
- Pupil evolution observed in five areas of leadership: well-being (+5%), sense of belonging (+6%), self-awareness (+15%), independence (+16%), knowledge (+5.4%)

Duration: 2025 → 2028

The Luminos Fund uses education to empower young Liberians deprived of schooling as a result of the major crises in their country. The project, launched in 2024, offers a catch-up programme in literacy and numeracy, alongside practical and vocational skills, in partnership with the Ministry of Youth and Sports. The aim, by 2028, is to provide 5,000 young people with the tools necessary to continue their training, access employment and build a future.

Organisation: Teach For All

Project: Strengthening alumni leadership

Duration: 2024 → 2027

Present in more than 60 countries, Teach For All recruits, trains and supports committed teachers and leaders, known as "fellows", to provide children from disadvantaged communities with access to high-quality education. Drawing on a network of almost 115,000 alumni, it promotes learning and developing leadership skills, allowing former fellows to pursue their commitment and help transform local education systems. ↴

"Being part of this group of incredibly committed, passionate, enlightened leaders was truly inspiring. As a young headteacher in Uruguay, working in a small community confronted with vulnerability, this experience heightened my conviction that big changes can happen when they are built on networks, a collective vision and shared learning. 2025 Overview – Highlights and impact

In 2025, the alumni leadership development project made significant progress in consolidating sustainable leadership and creating active learning communities within the Teach For All network. The initiatives encouraged international collaboration, supported social innovation and developed the ability of alumni to address the systemic challenges affecting education.

Results

- More than 75% of the 115,000 alumni in the network take up work or further training to combat inequalities in education
- 29 alumni leaders in 16 countries completed an 8-month training programme combining virtual sessions with in-person gatherings in Austria and Estonia
- 100% of participants recommend the programme
- The EdLaunch Africa incubator 2025 supported 14 alumni projects, and 5 received start-up funding (Ethiopia, Kenya, Nigeria and Uganda)
- Launch of the European "Policy & Practice" community, bringing together more than 40 alumni from 17 countries in working groups focused on key challenges such as retaining teachers and digital equality
- The global community of alumni headteachers held a 5-day gathering in Chile bringing together 19 members from 12 countries

The Girls Opportunity Alliance Network is working to empower teenage girls in Africa through education, in order to reduce inequalities and help them find employment. It meets a crucial need, providing a collaborative space for grassroots organisations working with teenage girls. The project supports the extension of the network across Africa, the training of local NGOs and the organisation of regional get-togethers to strengthen abilities and share good practices. This support helps offer young girls educational opportunities and promote their role as agents of change.

RWANDA

Organisation: Swisscontact

Project: Dual+ for Rural

Duration: 2025 → 2027



The goal of the Dual+ for Rural project is to help young people to find employment in rural Rwanda where the unemployment rate is 18%. Inspired by the dual training model applied in urban areas, this pilot project will offer 500 young people practical training, theory modules and entrepreneurial mentorship in partnership with local stakeholders and the Rwanda TVET Board.



SAUDI ARABIA

Organisation: The Womanity Foundation

Project: Creating career opportunities for young unemployed women in the MENA region

Duration: 2024 → 2026

This project seeks to empower women in Saudi Arabia by giving them the skills, resources and support they need to secure skilled employment in the media. It is primarily intended to improve the career prospects of women looking for their first job. By promoting their employability and helping reduce gender disparities in the media, the project is playing a key role in the economic empowerment of women in the country.

The increase from 55 to 566 secure jobs in the space of a year demonstrates the success of a model that combines technology with human engagement.



2025 Overview – Highlights and impact

After a year spent creating the recruitment platform Saudiaat, in 2025 the foundation was able to significantly accelerate its activities by gradually earning the trust of companies and beneficiaries – helped by word of mouth – improving coaching capabilities and developing skills workshops. This dynamic saw it move from 55 secure posts in 2024 to 566 in 2025, demonstrating the effectiveness of a model combining artificial intelligence with individual support.

Results

- 566 women found a job
- 610 beneficiaries coached, including 535 who secured a job (success rate: 87.7%)
- 1,770 job interviews conducted, 34.5% of which with candidates who benefited from individual support
- 399 employers using the platform, and a total of 2,329 offers published
- 6,379 participants at 12 online workshops (job search techniques, careers in the media, AI tools)
- 776 beneficiaries completed the 7 tutorials dedicated to soft skills
- 2,900 beneficiaries completed the 5 tutorials on AI tools

Project: Youth training

Duration: 2025 → 2028



Caritas Geneva is tackling poverty and exclusion by helping vulnerable people to regain their independence and dignity. Faced with the risk of 2,500 young untrained people falling into poverty, the project supports the "Formation jeunes" youth training programme. Every year, it allows around twenty participants to obtain an *attestation fédérale de formation professionnelle* (AFP – federal vocational training certificate) or a *certificat fédéral de capacité* (CFC – federal vocational training diploma).



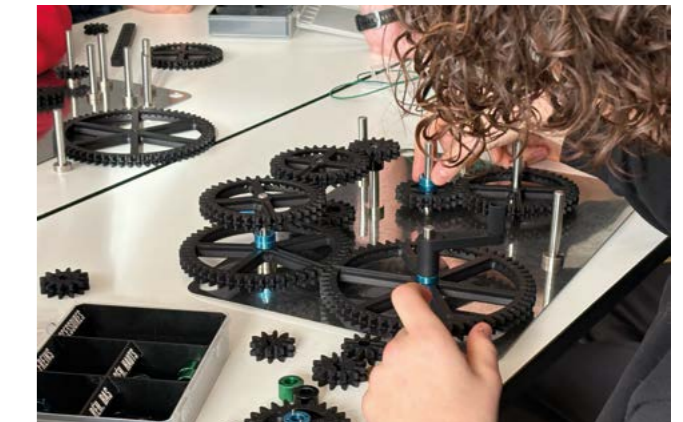

Organisation: Unité scientifique mobile

Project: Scientific outreach for manual and technical professions

Duration: 2025 → 2029

Unité scientifique mobile makes young people aware of the scientific approach to developing critical thinking and technical skills that are essential to tackling current challenges in education. The project supports two initiatives: Histoire-Métiers which proposes interactive workshops based on technical trades, and Engrenage, which introduces students to scientific experimentation and trains teachers in approaches that promote collaboration and problem-solving.

Duration: 2024 → 2027

Yojoa's mission is to accelerate the professional inclusion of young people who have migrated to Switzerland. Convinced that diversity is a driver of collective intelligence and performance for companies, the organisation has developed an innovative model that allows young people to enter the job market through tangible internships, apprenticeships and first job opportunities.

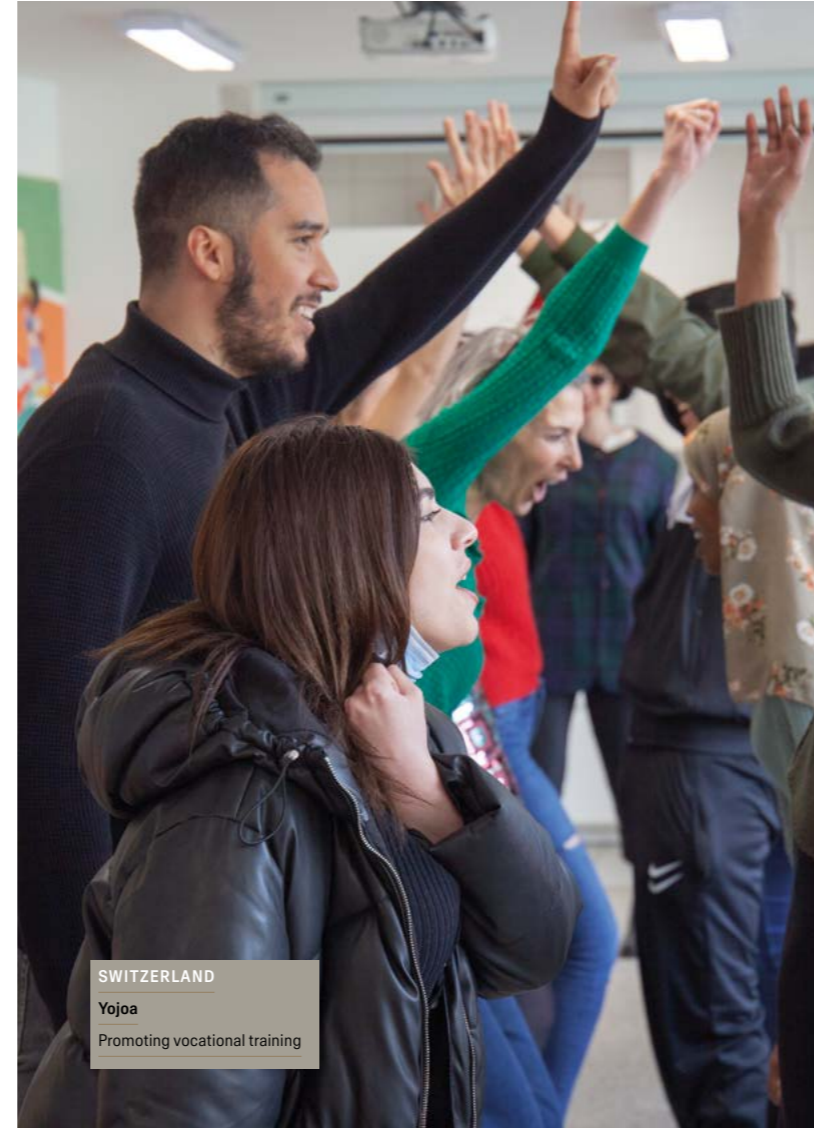
2025 Overview – Highlights and impact

In 2025, Yojoa consolidated its strategic partnerships, particularly with the Hospice général and ACCESS II, while developing and diversifying its support services. The year was marked by an increase in activities, the introduction of new forms of support and its expansion into French-speaking Switzerland.

Results

- 207 young people supported (coaching + soft skills)
- 60 young people referred by the Hospice général, representing a 200% increase since 2023
- Implementation of a new 3-month collective support programme
- Development of a new educator training model
- Roll-out in the canton of Vaud with an initial soft skills training programme
- Launch of a programme impact assessment, led by an external firm

Organisation: Teach For Uganda

Project: **"Teaching as collective" fellowship programme**

Duration: 2024 → 2027

The "Teaching as collective" programme aims to improve fundamental reading and maths skills in disadvantaged public primary schools. It trains and places young graduates – known as "fellows" – as teachers and community leaders, while strengthening the involvement of families and the quality of teaching at the start of schooling. The project targets classes where learning difficulties are particularly pronounced.

UGANDA

Organisation: Wezesha Impact

Project: **"Wezesha Impact Skills & Enterprise (W.I.S.E)" programme**

Duration: 2025 → 2028

Wezesha Impact is working to increase the job prospects of young people by giving them practical skills and entrepreneurial opportunities. The project supports the Wezesha Impact Skills & Enterprise (W.I.S.E) programme which combines vocational training, support for companies managed by young people and the promotion of entrepreneurship. The goal is to improve access to employment and promote lasting solutions to prevent unemployment among young people in Uganda.



2025 Overview – Highlights and impact

In 2025, Teach For Uganda extended its activities in four rural districts. The pupils concerned recorded significant improvements in literacy and numeracy, while the fellows showed clear progress in their professional development. The project also mobilised parents, government teachers and communities around academic success.

Results

- 97 fellows deployed in 49 disadvantaged public schools
- 12,370 pupils supported (initial objective: 5,600)
- 6,069 home visits to improve attendance and links between families and schools
- Increase in the number of pupils capable of reading a short text from 2.28% to 7%
- Improvement in numeracy: from 3.5% to 18%
- 948 classes observed and 1,778 coaching sessions
- 222 community projects organised (4 times the annual objective)
- 222 new alumni, constituting the largest cohort of graduates from the organisation

Project: Structuring the finance department

Duration: 2025 → 2026

De l'or dans les mains works to promote manual trades and guides young people in discovering these skills. The project is helping to structure its finance department in order to professionalise its management and consolidate its development. This will contribute to the implementation of financial tools and processes, training the team and recruiting a dedicated manager in order to ensure the longevity and expansion of the organisation's activities.



FRANCE

Organisation: Institut Européen de Coopération et Développement (IECD)

Project: Working towards the socio-professional inclusion of people with significant barriers to employment by supporting the structuring of integration stakeholders within a collective

Duration: 2024 → 2027

This project seeks to improve the social and professional inclusion of people in Marseille who are facing significant barriers to employment, by helping to organise employment insertion stakeholders within a collective. It combines tailored support for organisations, skills development for employment insertion professionals and the creation of collaborative collective dynamics. There are three objectives: improving the quality of support, increasing the number of beneficiaries and ensuring the long-term success of partner organisations.

2025 Overview – Highlights and impact

In 2025, the project pursued its objective to consolidate and structure the stakeholders in professional integration in France. The actions undertaken helped increase the professionalism of partner associations, develop new synergies and capitalise on ongoing experiences in order to facilitate its wider application.

Results

- Increased individual support for 3 organisations: Appel d'Aire, Massajobs and Wake up Café
- More than 650 people supported in partner structures
- Monthly meetings between organisation directors
- Participation of more than 100 professionals from 40 different organisations in group activities: 6 sessions analysing professional practices, 5 working breakfasts, a collaborative day
- Creation of a learning community and the formation of a local network of integration professionals

Duration: 2025 → 2030

La France s'engage promotes social innovation and public engagement by supporting innovative, socially responsible initiatives that benefit as many people as possible. Every year, it assists around fifteen promising projects for a period of three years, by offering them the strategic support they need to upscale and expand. This support helps strengthen governance, economic structure and impact, promoting the development of inclusive solutions for the common good.

Organisation: Le Philanthro-Lab

Project: Acceleration programme

Duration: 2024 → 2026

The Philanthro-Lab is a space dedicated to the growth of philanthropy in Paris. Driven by the success of its incubator programme intended to professionalise young non-profit structures, and faced with the increasing demand from more mature organisations wishing to benefit from similar support, the Philanthro-Lab launched a second programme in 2024: L'Accélérateur. This completely free accelerator scheme offers four months of collective and individual support to a dozen charity sector managers to help make their organisation more professional, secure their development, refine their strategy vision and improve leadership.

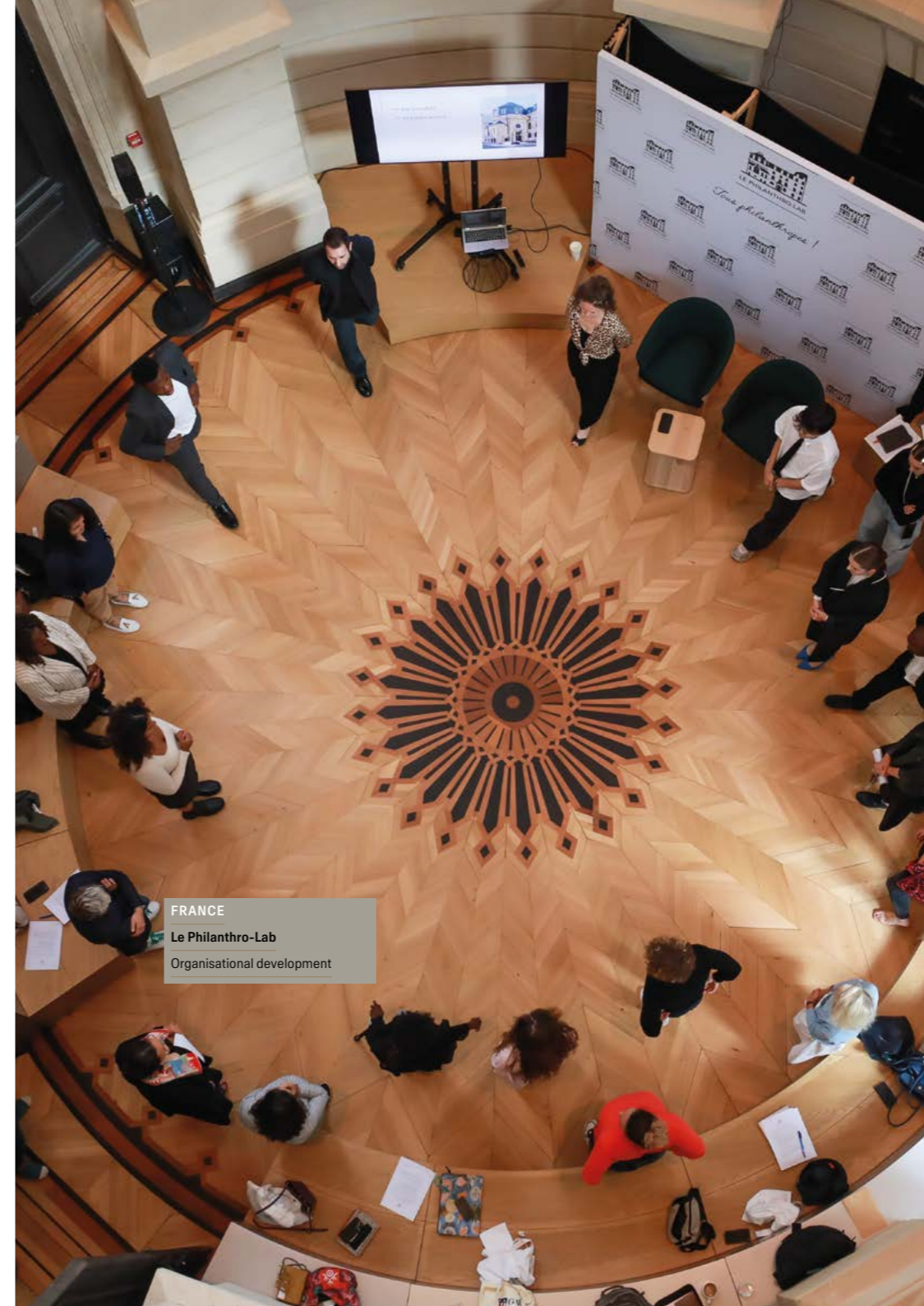

2025 Overview – Highlights and impact

In 2025, the second edition of the accelerator programme supported 11 prize-winning projects and 12 charity managers. The support, based on collective intelligence, gatherings and discussions among peers, allowed beneficiaries to develop their projects and their ability to make an impact.

Results

- 27 training programmes and collective workshops
- 12 hours of individual coaching per prizewinner to enhance their impact as leaders
- 7 professional skills masterclasses
- 22 expert partners involved
- 4 gatherings to create connections within the non-profit and philanthropic sectors
- Upscaling and development: +53% of charity managers capable of formalising a growth strategy
- Public relations and promotion: +50% of charity managers capable of promoting their organisation's mission
- Regulatory framework: 25% improvement in legal and fiscal compliance

Organisation: European Food Banks Federation (FEBA)

Project: Establishing a unified impact assessment framework within the FEBA network

Duration: 2025 → 2027

The project aims to create a standardised assessment framework, making it possible to measure not just the volume redistributed but also the impact of the food banks on health, access to nutritious food and the reduction of waste. This approach will encourage long-term, transparent solutions, contributing to fairer, more resilient food systems.



MULTI-COUNTRY

Organisation: Nonprofit Builder

Project: A one-stop shop for organisational development

Duration: 2025 → 2027

To strengthen the impact of its partners involved in food aid, the Audemars Piguet Foundation for Common Good offers tailored organisational development support. Around fifteen organisations based in Europe and the United States will be able to benefit from the support of Nonprofit Builder, a network of consultants specialised in capacity building for NGOs. This initiative seeks to help organisations to implement solutions adapted to the challenges they face, develop new expertise and help their structure to progress.

Duration: 2025 → 2026

Unité scientifique mobile makes young people more aware of technical and scientific careers using educational approaches based on experimental learning. In addition to the Foundation offering its support to implement its programmes, it is also helping the organisation to become more professional. The project includes developing a SWOT analysis, establishing recommendations for improving the structure's efficiency and effectiveness, as well as working on organisational alignment.

Project: Implementation of organisational development

Duration: 2024 → 2026

Yojoa, whose professional inclusion activities have been supported by the Foundation since January 2024, obtained additional organisational development funding following a diagnostic assessment. The aim of this funding is to support the growth of the organisation and the diversification of its services. The action plan includes support from a consultant, ongoing individual training and collective workshops on workplace culture. This support will allow Yojoa to face the challenges related to its rapid growth, in the context of the extension of its programmes to new audiences and new regions.

Supporting Yojoa's growth and the diversification of its employment integration programmes.



2025 Overview – Highlights and impact

In 2025, Yojoa consolidated its organisational transformation while continuing its strong growth. The year was marked by strengthened governance, the adoption of new structural tools, the evolution of roles within the team, and preparing for a major transition related to the departure of one of the co-founders. Employees highlighted a significant improvement in clarity, communication and well-being at work, confirming the positive impact of organisational development.

Results

- 6 workshops on key topics (feedback, establishing priorities, 5-year vision, strategic alignment, governance etc.)

- 4 coaching cycles on specific topics (HR, role transition, managing tension etc.)
- 3 coordination sessions dedicated to strategic monitoring and improving internal tools
- A 3-day retreat dedicated to governance, strategy and workplace culture
- Implementation and widespread adoption of management and governance tools (GlassFrog, Planner, internal roadmaps)
- Internal survey showing significant progress in 5 areas: clarity of shared management (4.33/5), roles and responsibilities (4.22/5), decision-making processes (4.44/5), HR support (4.89/5), working environment (4.78/5)

Teach For Uganda trains and supports young university graduates – known as "fellows" – to help them become engaged teachers and leaders in communities where access to high-quality education is limited. Since 2024, the Audemars Piguet Foundation for Common Good has been supporting the organisation in order to extend its activities to a new region each year. The organisational development diagnostic project and action plan is part of this expansion drive. It also aims to strengthen internal leadership by supporting strategy evolution and promoting the expertise of executives, in particular by working on capacities and roles, and the allocation of responsibilities.

Optimising governance, consolidating internal processes and giving NGOs the means to plan for the future with confidence.

EMERGENCY AID IN THE EVENT OF NATURAL DISASTERS 2025 PROJECTS

Given the increase in the number of natural disasters, it is essential to support the organisations that work with local communities. Their presence on the ground, their in-depth understanding of needs, and their ability to act quickly allow them to provide immediate help and strengthen the resilience of populations for the long term. In 2025, the Audemars Piguet Foundation for Common Good provided emergency aid to 10 organisations in Asia, Europe and North America.

Asia

In March 2025, the Audemars Piguet Foundation for Common Good intervened in South Korea and Japan where major wildfires broke out.

In Korea, more than 48,000 hectares were destroyed and around 27,000 residents had to be evacuated. Almost 10,000 firefighters, 7,500 soldiers and 420 helicopters were mobilised to fight the fires and protect the population and UNESCO world heritage sites.

Alongside this emergency aid, a donation was made to the Korea National Council on Social Welfare, a key stakeholder in social solidarity for more than 70 years. This donation funded the purchase and distribution of basic necessities and the provision of psychological support, and contributed to providing emergency accommodation for victims.

Ofunato in the north-east of Japan was also affected by wildfires, which destroyed around 2,900 hectares of land and more than 200 buildings, leading to the evacuation of around 4,500 people who were given refuge in emergency centres organised by the local authorities. In response to this disaster, the Foundation renewed its support for the Association for Aid and Relief Japan, to assist with the wide variety of aid it offers victims. This contribution notably helped fund legal consultations to help victims understand their rights and the services they might be eligible for.

In November 2025, violent storms caused extensive flooding in Thailand, particularly in the south, near Songkhla and Hat Yai. Torrential rain damaged key infrastructure, forcing thousands of people to leave their homes and plunging several communities into a humanitarian emergency. Almost 3 million people were affected, with a severe impact on access to drinking water and healthcare. In response to this crisis, several national and international organisations mobilised their teams, including Raks Thai Foundation and Scholars of Sustenance (SOS). The Audemars Piguet Foundation for Common Good supported their activities by funding the purchase of basic necessities and safety equipment and covering the logistical costs related to their distribution.

Europe

In early 2025, the French island of Mayotte, in the Comoros archipelago, was hit by cyclone Chido followed by tropical storm Dikeledi. These events had a major impact on living conditions, and caused an urgent need for water, food, electricity, shelter and basic healthcare. Pursuing its commitment to combat food insecurity, the Audemars Piguet Foundation for Common Good provided emergency support through a donation to the Mascareignes food bank, a key stakeholder in local solidarity.

In Switzerland, the Foundation supported operations led by REDOG, the Swiss society for search and rescue dogs, mobilised after the collapse of the Birch glacier which destroyed the village of Blatten in the canton of Valais.

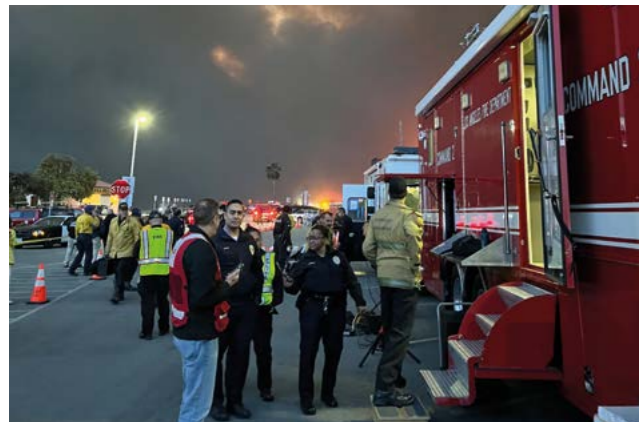
In September 2025, Spain was hit by one of its most destructive wildfires in decades, which ravaged almost 350,000 hectares and caused four deaths. The Foundation supported SOS WildFire, an organisation committed to developing the capacity to prevent, manage and extinguish wildfires in a context of climate change.

EMERGENCY AID FOR NATURAL DISASTERS 2025 PROJECTS

North America

In January 2025, the Foundation supported the Los Angeles Fire Department Foundation, the California Fire Foundation and Baby2Baby's Disaster Relief programme following the devastating wildfires in Los Angeles County.

The emergency aid allocated to the Los Angeles Fire Department Foundation made it possible to purchase tools, materials and essential protective equipment for firefighters. The California Fire Foundation distributed vouchers to the victims, allowing them to purchase basic necessities or cover housing costs. Lastly, the contribution paid to Baby2Baby funded the purchase of essential products for families as well as materials and food for emergency shelters and distribution points throughout Los Angeles.
